## Dramedy? Tragicomedy? Just 'life'?

Charlene Wexler's Elephants in the Room

**COLORING BOOKS FOR ADULTS** are all the rage. But Charlene Wexler's latest book of essays, Elephants in the Room, seems more of a connect-the-dots work. The "dots" are individual instances, conversations, objects, even pets she recalls. Then she connects these dots to form a bigger picture: an insight or revelation into the human condition.

Some of the dots are revealed in the titles of her essays themselves: "Second Date," "Apple Strudel," "The Metra Train." These, in turn, are organized into chapters covering the range of a lifespan, from "Coming of Age" to "Senior Moments," with family, friends, pets, and observations on changing times filling her days. We learn what is like to be a teenager in 1959, and a 70-year-old in a new millen-

nium. In her wry observations of daily life, her work recalls that of Erma Bombeck and Dave Barry.

"I have always used writing as therapy," Wexler said. "Now I have the time and opportunity to pursue it as a career. You can do it, and it's never too late."


By turns devastatingly funny and simply devastating, Wex-

ler's stories often focus on relationships— between parents and children, siblings, spouses, humans and nature, even the physical and the metaphysical. In one story, she tells about fainting at a dinner party - only to find out that, at that moment, her sister, in an ER 2,000 miles away, had just been told she had a brain tumor. Her fainting and her sister's illness may be "dots," but how they are connected ..? That's a bigger picture, and another story.


Wexler was born in Chicago and is a graduate of the University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign. After years of teaching and office work, she found success as a writer of personal essays, poetry, and fiction. Her other books include Milk and Oranges (a similar style to Elephants in the Room), two murder mysteries, and the family saga Lori.
